### Safe Bicycling in Fort Collins

Please be a good example of a respectful bicyclist and respect the rules of the road. Ride with lights at night. Stop at traffic lights and stop signs. Use hand signals and eye contact to communicate your turns to motorists. Ride on the right hand side of the road and when cycling on bike trails signal to pass pedestrians and other cyclists with your bike bell. Always wear a helmet.

### Bicycling Info & Tips

Bicycles are a sensible form of transportation in Fort Collins. Our City offers over 280 miles of bike lanes, and 30 miles of bike trails. Bicycling on College Ave in downtown is legal, but recommended for experienced bicyclists only. Please walk your bicycles through Old Town Square and on sidewalks in the downtown area. Bicycling on roads is recommended and legal. In case of emergency, dial 911. In the event of mechanical difficulties or need for directions, please call 970.491.1050 or 970.484.3804.

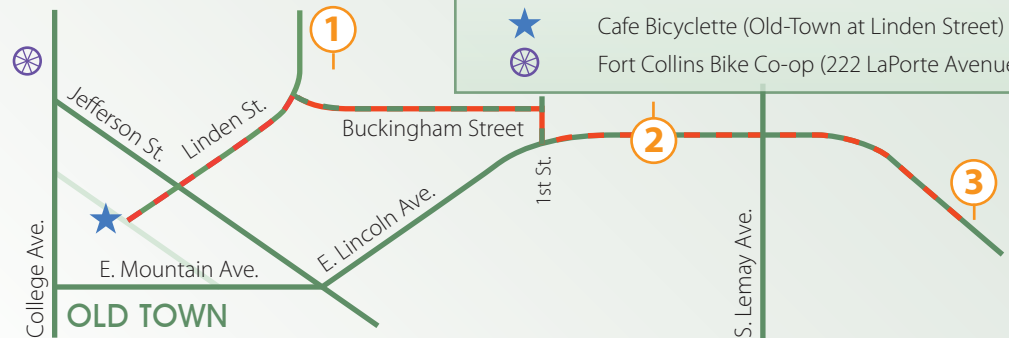
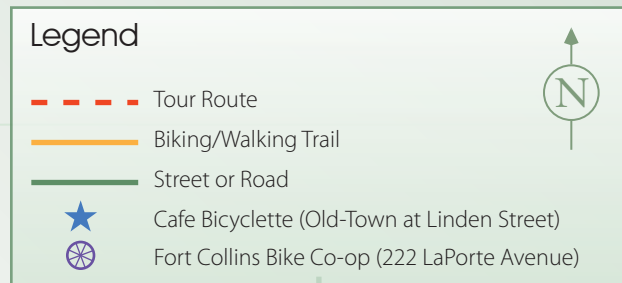

Fort Collins is home to some of the best microbreweries in the world. With world-famous beers from New Belgium and Odell's, Fort Collins is definitely "on-the-map" when it comes to unique and diverse micro-brews.

Also make sure to visit other local breweris such as Coopersmiths and C.B. & Potts.



## New Belgium Brewery

The New Belgium Brewery is one of the staples of Fort Collins. Founded in 1991 in the basement of a local Ft. Collins couple, this brewery is quickly becoming a national brand name. Thanks to its Fat Tire beer, New Belgium is a recognizable name in most bars and pubs.

Step inside the greenbuilt building and learn about how much this company cares about the environment and its employees and how they recently became the first wind-powered brewery in the nation. Pick four beers to taste as a complimentary visitor gift. Try the award-winning beers and ask about the Brown Bottle Recycling Program.



## Odell's Brewery

The Odell Brewing Company is another household name throughout Fort Collins.

The idea began in Seattle, but the brewery opened in 1989 in Fort Collins as the second microbrewery in Colorado.

This brewery also strives to be "green" by recycling as much as possible and using renewable resources. Don't worry about the nominal fee to taste the beers; you can donate your share to whatever particular charity the brewery is sponsoring that month. Try the India Pale Ale, which won a gold medal at the Great American Beer Festival.
